# Presidents' Report From Marlene Daubert

Many of you know I love to watch movies. The movie group was one of the reasons I joined AAUW, 4½ years ago. I recently did a search on great movies on leadership and management via IMDb. A list of 43 movies came up. Only one, #41 (Miss Sloane), was the only one with a woman as leader. Why is that? Have we not had strong women leaders? Or perhaps the movie industry has not chosen to make movies of women leaders? Or perhaps those making the list had bias. I'm sure there is some truth in all of these reasons. Women have made a lot of progress, but we still have a long way to go!

One of the goals we have prioritized this year in our branch is Cultivating Leadership. We have a team working on this to help us continue to grow in this area. We have some wonderful and talented leaders in our branch who help us be the best branch we can be, providing inspiring programs, learning and growing in a multitude of ways, including awareness of our biases, keeping us informed of policy issues, and giving us the opportunity to be advocates as well as assume many other roles. It's important that our members continue to step up and take on these leadership roles.

We also celebrate that we have leaders who are active and making a difference in the Greater Elgin Area as well. For example, this past weekend was the Elgin MLK breakfast online. I was proud of our AAUW members who had a part: Linda Knight who spoke from her role as board chair of the YWCA; Sue Schulz and Rosemary Dyson who announced the MLK scholarship winners. We also have Gareth Mann, who is our Elgin Poet Laureate. The list goes on, but I hope you see the wide influence our members have in the larger community in these two examples.

In addition, leaders also help to pay it forward by providing support and encouragement to newer leaders. This can happen in a number of ways. One way is called mentoring forward, which is inviting newer leaders to walk alongside you, so they can learn and grow as you help to prepare them for a leadership role. This may mean inviting someone as co-chair or structuring our leadership a little differently to have a seasoned leader lead and a new leader join them, staggering years.

# Climate Change Solutions From Sandra Kaptain

Since the Elgin passage of the Resolution of the Climate Emergency status, along with the IPCC declaring it is Code Red for the climate, some of the members of Elgin Green Groups, Sierra Club VOF, and the new group, EA CAN or Elgin Area Climate Action NOW, have been busy. We have heard programs on community solar, green aggregation (municipal renewable electrical aggregation—hopefully, in May-June of this year) and nearby places to get sustainability products like Terra Vitae of Woodstock.

The City of Elgin, based on recommendations from the Sustainability Commission, now has a Sustainability Coordinator, Mikala Larsen. They are working on an Elgin

adaptation of the Metropolitan Mayors' Caucus Climate Action Plan adopted for the metro area.

But, as Greta Thunberg, Swedish teen activist says, "No one is too small to make a difference." We need governmental action, but that is usually driven by grass roots activism, so we can't just wait for others to do what we all can do!

With the passage of CEJA, the Illinois Clean Energy Jobs Act, this September, we can all benefit from going greener—get a phev car (hybrid electric) and a solar PV roof or sign onto Community Solar and let the companies invest for you! Less meat, more greens and beans! We can all do our part. Wild Ones is promoting Start in Your Yard—the program that promotes planting more natives in your yard—which sustains the birds, bees, and insects that are all a part of the cycle of life.

Unfortunately, all the hybrids and "resistant" plants don't help the cycle of life. They might make us happier for a summer, but if the bugs, birds, and bees can't live, we can't either! Check out <a href="StartInYourYard.org">StartInYourYard.org</a> and be part of the solution to climate change!

## **Public Policy Report** From Shirley May Byrnes

Illinois General Assembly Spring Session: Bills Introduced The Spring 2022 Illinois General Assembly is underway, albeit in a shortened format with numerous days cancelled due to COVID concerns, although committees continue to meet remotely and bills are being introduced. Those we oppose include the ones that seek to limit property taxes; those we support include those advocating for more accessible highspeed broadband, which dovetails with one of our legislative priorities: broadband for Illinois public libraries. Just vesterday, two bills were introduced in the Illinois House and Senate to advance our other legislative priority: equitable, "reasonable" access to electronic literature for libraries. SB 3167 and HB 4470, both titled the "Equitable Access to Electronic Literature Act," have been introduced for this purpose. Illinois Library Association (ILA) e-newsletter, 1/13/22

LWV Wheaton Programs: Although the two programs mentioned have already happened, there will be additional programs in the coming months. The January 13th LWV Wheaton Zoom program on "Critical Race Theory: What it is and What it Isn't" with local historian and Eastern Illinois University professor Bonnie Laughlin-Schultz is part of the Civic Awareness Series cosponsored with Robert McCormick House at Cantigny Park. LWV Wheaton is beginning a regular Local Civil Engagement Series on the third Thursday of the month. The first program will be "Know the Difference Between Critical Race Theory and Culturally Responsive Teaching" on January 20th.

The first program on "Know the Difference Between Critical Race Theory and Culturally Responsive Teaching" will begin at 7 p.m. on Thursday, January 20th, on Zoom. It's a follow-up to the January 13th Civic Awareness program. In this program, a panel of local educators will discuss why culturally responsive teaching is important, how it applies to the classroom, and the confusion regarding Culturally Responsive Teaching and Critical Race Theory.
