THE FUTURE OF FOX RIVER DAMS

Saturday, February 10, 1:00 p.m. Elgin Township Building 729 S. McLean Blvd., Elgin

In September of 2023, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers recommended the removal of nine dams on the Fox River. Art Malm, a retired civil and environmental engineer, will detail the reasons Friends of the Fox applauded this. But because Elgin gets its drinking water from the Fox, removal of its dam will present a major challenge to be overcome. This Elgin's Mayor Dave Kaptain, retired Chief Chemist and Process Control Manager of the Fox River Reclamation District, will explain.

WOMEN IN THE WORLD

I'm breaking with my practice of excluding American women from this column in order to call attention to a fascinating book published in 2022: *The Only Woman* by Immy Humes.

While working on a film about Shirley Clarke, Humes stumbled across an arresting 1962 photograph of Clarke surrounded by seven of her fellow documentary film-makers, all of them men (which all documentary film-makers except Clarke were at the time). And down the rabbit hole Humes went: over a five-year period, she collected innumerable photographs in which a single woman was shown with a group of men. Her book is her "idiosyncratic" collection of 100 of them taken between 1860 to 2020.

The lone women include both unknown and well-known ones from a variety of backgrounds. (Of the 20 whose names I recognized, only 11 were women I knew more than just a little about.)

Not surprisingly, most of the women are from North America, Great Britain and Europe, for it is in these sections of the world that women have made the greatest strides in "making their way into a man's world."

My favorite photograph, for example, is of the President of the Central European Bank, Christine Lagarde. Dressed in a light blue silk suit and wearing chic heels, she is shown with her back to the camera as she addresses a group of black-suited men who are clearly appreciative of her.

But it was not the photographs that compelled me to buy three copies of the book. Humes has described herself as "a research maniac" who "love[s] archives," and *The Only Woman* is proof of this. It is the information she provides about the women and their circumstances that made this a must-own, must-gift book for me.

For instance, in addition to detailing Lagarde's background in the underrepresented field of finance, Humes also notes that Meryl Streep said that she "channeled the unassailable elegance and authority" of this French woman when preparing for her role in *The Devil Wears Prada*.

To give you a better idea of just how interesting Humes' collection is, I had prepared a listing of 35 other women, including the lone female juror in the Julius/Ethel Rosenburg trial and the wife (briefly) of the founder of the Turkish Republic. However, I have opted to simply note that Gail Borden Public Library has a copy of *The Only Woman*. I urge you to check it out.

U.S. MINT HONORS AMERICAN WOMEN from Barbara Evans

The quarters to be released in 2024—the third year of the American Women Quarters Program—feature the following women:

- Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray poet, writer, activist, lawyer, and Episcopal priest
- Patsy Takemoto Mink first woman of color to serve in Congress
- Dr. Mary Edwards Walker Civil War era surgeon, women's rights and dress reform advocate
- Celia Cruz Cuban-American singer, cultural icon
- Zitkala-Ša writer, composer, educator, and political activist

The U.S. Mint is now also accepting preorders for its commemorative coin program honoring abolitionist Harriet Tubman, a program which "comes amid stalled efforts to replace former President Jackson's face on the \$20 bill with Tubman's." Included is the \$5 gold coin shown above as well as silver dollar and half-dollar. Be aware, however, that the price for one is not the face value of the coin. The \$5 one, for example, is listed for \$718.
